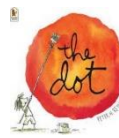
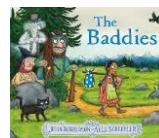


Key Vocabulary

Comma	A comma is a punctuation mark that separates items in a list.
Apostrophe	Apostrophes are punctuation marks to show possession and contraction on. E.g. Sam's or I'd.
Command	Commands are a type of sentence in which someone is being told to do something.
Statement	Statements are sentences that express a fact, idea or opinion.
Coordinating conjunction	Conjunctions are joining words that link together parts of a sentence. The three main coordinating conjunctions are: and, but and or.
Subordinating conjunction	A subordinating conjunction is simply the word/words that is used to join a subordinating clause to another clause or sentence. For example: He was annoyed, the train had stopped.
